

Jobless youth say **Bhupesh Govt is** offering lollipop of Rs 2500 instead of giving jobs

Raipur, Apr Thousands of unemployed youths across the state reached the capital Raipur to participate in the demonstration staged by Chhattisgarh Trained DED, BEd Association near Budhatalab under the banner of DEd-BEd Kalyan Sangh-Faculty of Arts. They shouted slogans against the state government and raised their demand.

Despite availability of lakhs of vacant posts in various government departments, no recruitment has been done, said the protestors. Chhattisgarh government has stopped the recruitment for the last 1 year, stating that the reservation is pending in the High Court, they said



adding that many posts are lying vacant in education, health, police, revenue, water resources, agriculture, electricity, veterinary departments. The agitating unemployed youths have demanded the state government to start recruitment on these posts

The youth said that Chief Minister Bhupesh Baghel had announced the

10,000 teachers and other posts in August 2022 but neither notification had been issued nor the process of recruitment had started yet. Delay in the process of recruitment caused widespread resentment among the unemployed youth, the agitating youth said.

The unemployed youth have demanded recruitment of special teachers teachers, junior engineers, professors, RIs, Patwaris, Amin Patwaris, hostel superintendents, VYAPAM Joint Recruitment, GPSC. Cooperative, Forest Guards, Home Guards, librarians, arts and science teachers, veterinary doc-

They demanded to start the recruitment process before the elections according to the 50% reser-

tors, and several posts.

'It is not possible to sustain at 2500'





Application window for CUET-UG reopens

New Delhi, Apr 09 (PTI)

The application window for CUET-UG reopened Sunday for three days following representation from students and there will be no change in the syllabus after rationalisation of NCERT textbooks, officials said.

"Following requests from several students, we have decided to re-open the application portal for CUET-UG on Sunday. Monday, and Tuesday and it will close at 11.59 pm on Tuesday (11 April 2023). Students are requested to visit cuet.samarth.ac.in for more details," UGC Jagadesh Chairman Kumar said.

Nearly 14 lakh students have applied for CUET-UG, up by 41 per cent since last year. Following rationalisation of NCERT books, aspirants of undergraduate entrance exams were confused about whether it will impact the entrances.

"The notified syllabus will remain the same as the exam is not just for students from a particular board. Not all boards have rationalised the content," a senior National Testing Agency (NTA) official

CUET-UG remains the second-largest entrance exam in the country in terms of applicants. In the debut edition of CUET-UG, 12.50 lakh students registered themselves and 9.9 lakh of them submitted their applications.

The \overline{N} ational Eligibilitycum-Entrance Undergraduate (NEET-UG) for medical admissions is the largest entrance test in India with an average of 18 lakh registrations.

The last date for applications for CUET-UG was March 30 and the exam is scheduled to be conducted 40-day season of Lent. 15 tourists trapped on rocks rescued from Narmada river

The water was released after sounding the siren, as usual but some people did not come out of the water and got trapped on rocks, he said.

Boatmen and home guards posted in the area rescued people, the official said, adding that more rescuers from home guard will be stationed in the area in future.

As the water level was low, some people ventured into the river up to 50-60 metres, but the water level went up once the dam water was released and they got trapped, Bhawaria, an eyewitness,

Later, they were rescued by boatmen with the help of ropes, he said.

Some videos of the incident have also surfaced on social media, in which boatmen are seen using their boats to rescue people trapped in the river

"These are very high quality teakwood furniture pieces which are otherwise not available outside with private suppliers. We make the chairs of judges. The Pune Central Jail makes special judges' chairs with monogram which cannot be made outside," said Kumre.

The Nagpur Central Jail had received a contract of Rs 5.50 crore for the furniture. The work had started in March 2021 and the delivery of these furniture items is now in the final stages, Agey said.

The intention of the prison administration behind this exercise is correction and rehabilitation of prisoners and provide them some employment in jail, she said. "We continuously guidance from Additional Director General (Prisons) Amitabh Gupta and DIG (Prisons) Swati Sathe in pursuing and completing such projects," Agey added.

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Politicising Education

s students gear up for the academic year 2023-24, a storm is brewing over the new history and political science textbooks prescribed by the National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) for senior and senior secondary classes. The changes made to the curriculum have raised concerns about the selective rewriting and distortion of history to suit a political agenda. One of the most egregious omissions in the new textbooks is the deletion of chapters related to Mahatma Gandhi's efforts to promote Hindu-Muslim unity in the months before and after the Partition of India in 1947. Gandhi's attempts were reportedly linked to his assassination and the subsequent ban on the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) for a short period. Removing this portion of the study material deprives students of a holistic understanding of the period, denying them the opportunity to develop critical thinking and a broad outlook on our social and political past. Similarly concerning is the removal of key aspects of the Mughal period and the whitewashing of the Gujarat riots. By cherry-picking certain events and downplaying others, the NCERT is distorting history and presenting a skewed version of the past. Adding to the controversy is the surreptitious manner in which these changes were made. Unlike other proposed changes that were published last June, these alterations were not disclosed, leading to accusations of bias and political interference. The NCERT Director's dismissal of the issue as a mere "oversight" is unconvincing, given the apparent ideological slant of the revisions. Education is a powerful tool that shapes our understanding of the world and our place in it. It is essential that the curriculum is designed with great care and caution to ensure that it is objective, comprehensive, and reflective of the diverse perspectives that make up our society. The NCERT books are endorsed by the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) and many state school boards, meaning that the changes made to the curriculum will have a far-reaching impact on millions of impressionable young minds. Curriculum changes are necessary to keep up with the times and ensure that students are equipped with the skills and knowledge they need to thrive in a rapidly changing world. However, these changes must be made with the utmost care and diligence, and they must not be motivated by political considerations. When politics is allowed to enter the classroom, it becomes a tool for propaganda rather than education, and the consequences can be dire. The role of education is to empower individuals to think critically, to question the status quo, and to engage with the world in a meaningful way. It is not to indoctrinate them with a particular worldview or to promote a particular agenda. When education is politicized, it becomes a weapon, not a tool, and it can be used to divide rather than unite. The NCERT must take these concerns seriously and ensure that the curriculum is designed with the best interests of students in mind. This means providing a comprehensive and balanced view of history and politics, including the difficult and uncomfortable parts, and encouraging students to engage with these issues in a thoughtful and reflective way. Education is the cornerstone of a free and democratic society. It is essential that we protect it from the corrosive influence of politics and ensure that it remains a force for good in the world. The NCERT must act quickly to address the concerns raised by these changes and restore faith in the integrity of our education system. Only then can we ensure that our students are equipped with the knowledge and skills they need to build a better future for us all.

India's ResilienceFight against COVID-19 continues

s India grapples with a surge in COVID-19 cases, it is crucial that citizens continue to take responsible measures to reduce transmission and protect themselves and others from the virus. Kerala women demand reforms in inheritance law

kind of churning has begun in A Kerala Muslim society with women coming out openly against the religion based personal laws imposed on them through the Mullah interpreted Sharia, which treats women as unequal in many ways, especially in inheritance of property from the parents. They ventured to form a Forum for Muslim Women's Gender Justice (FMWGJ) and in the meeting held by the forum in the first week of March saw Muslim women pouring out their grievance against the injustice meted to them through archaic Islamic personal laws. Both educated and uneducated, under distress regarding their property rights, demanded that Muslim Personal Law (Shariat) Application Act, 1937 has to be reformed at once to protect them from losing their right to property.

The Kozhikode event and its resolution to reform or abolish the Muslim personal law is the outcome of simmering discontent in the hearts of Muslim women due to the suppression of their rights by the outdated religious laws. The Muslim women finally got the courage to unshackle their religious fetters and follow their Hindu sisters in challenging the suppressive beliefs and practices. Supreme Court verdict in the Sabarimala case where Hindu woman was given the right to have darshan of Lord Ayyappa, which was hitherto banned by tradition. The Muslim women felt encouraged by the commitment of the CPM lead Left Front government of Kerala, in implementing the SC verdict by siding with the right of Hindu women, and thought Pinarayi Vijayan government of LDF will stand by them. With

the hope of garnering the support of 'secular', 'progressive' CPM the Forum (FMWGJ) invited their party leaders. But surprisingly the CPM has not stood by the FMWGJ but preferred to side by the Mullahs who are totally against any progressive law that favour women.

Some of the victims of discriminatory Muslim law who narrated their troubles include a 26 year old Muslim lady whose father died, intestate, due to covid leaving 20 crore worth property and 2 crore debt. She planned to sell some of the property to clear the debt but she couldn't do that as her paternal uncles stalled the sale of property citing the Shariat. As per the law lone Muslim daughter, not having a brother, will receive only half of her father's property while the rest of the property is divided between the brothers of the deceased, even though those brothers have no role in building that property. Thus brothers who never helped the man when he was sick suddenly became inheritors of the property upon his death. A Muslim widow, whose husband worked in Gulf and built house in Tanur village of Malappuram district, has three daughters and no son. The three daughters got married when the husband was live. Widowed, uneducated and is dependent on the income from the property, but she can't sell that property to meet her needs as her husband's brother is not willing to sign the sale documents citing Islamic inheritance law and claiming his share.

Sensing the troubles their three daughters likely to face on their death a Muslim educated couple from Kasargod district of Kerala 'remarried' themselves under the special marriage Act 1954, to get the equal status for their daughters and to avoid the provision of Sharait laws. The second marriage, after 25 years of their original Nikha as per Muslim tradition, has sparked a row in the Muslim society. Their public statement that they did that 'remarriage' to free them from the clutches of clergy controlled Islamic law of inheritance has led to a fight between conser-

vatives and liberals of Kerala.

These three cases are only repre-

sentative and many such effected Muslim families are many but are not venting out because of high community pressure. The orthodox Mullahs are against any changes in the personal laws of their religion as reform will weaken their hold on the community hence their vehement opposition to even simple discussion on any fora. In fact a reformist cleric who floated Khuran Sunnath Society and challenged the Muslim personal law was allegedly murdered in 1993 and his body remained untraceable so far. His reformist agenda was taken up by woman Suhara who impleaded herself in a special leave petition filed in the Supreme Court in 2015. As per the Khuran Sunnath Society the Muslim personal law is violated the Articles 14 (equality before law), 15 (prohibition of discrimination on the ground of sex), 19 (freedom of expression), 21 (protection of life and personal liberty) and 25 (freedom of conscience and free profession, practice and propagation of religion).

While the Supreme Court entertained a petition on the Sabarimala temple entry for women issue on similar grounds and ruled in favour of the woman, the Kerala High Court rejected the petition saying it was up to the legislature to enact a law to resolve the matter. Though the issue reached the Supreme Court their lordships are not showing any urgency to deliver its verdict. Meanwhile the another petition for the Common Civil Code is filed before the Supreme Court and it may not be decided in the near future despite the importance at-

tached to that. In the entire episode, the stance of the CPM lead left front government of Kerala is rather curious. The CM Pinarayi Vijayan who is close to the Sunni clergy of Kerala is reportedly vouched for the validity of the existing law of inheritance, though it hurts the interests of women in the society, and said he will not involve itself in any matter related to the Muslim personal law. His other statement questioning the criminalization of the instant divorce among the Muslim. The vote bank politics of CPM through its communal agenda can be gauzed from the statement of

CPM state secretary M.V. Govindan giving the leverage for the Muslim community to self-reform and democratization. However the CPM is not known to such lenient attitude towards the issues concerning the Hindu society. That speaks volumes regarding the 'progressive ruling of Left' commitment to the women's rights and its secular beliefs.

Following the support of the CPM lead LDF to the conservative Islamic laws, the Muslim clergy are issuing highly radical statements. They express their opposition to amend their religious laws. Their contention is that "Muslim personal law is based on the Ouran and Prophet's verses. None other than Allah can change the sharia. So there is no question of changing it to suit the times". One of the clergy argued that law gave Muslim women the financial rights but not financial responsibilities but it is the man, either as brother or husband, who is bestowed with financial responsibilities by the Islam and this should not be questioned by women. The outflow trend is likely to reverse in the current financial year since India has the best growth potential in the financial year 2023-24 (FY24), VK Vijayakumar, Investment Strategist at Geojit Financial Services,

Market analysts believe that FPI flows in the current financial year would be decided by a host of facFederal Reserve's policy emerging markets, includment and development in the geopolitical situation.

Since FPIs started investing in 1993, this is the first time they sold consecutively for two financial years. They sold equities worth Rs 1.4 lakh crore in FY22. However, the pace of selling slowed down to Rs 37,632 crore in FY23, data with the depositories showed.

Before these outflows, FPIs invested a record Rs 2.7 lakh crore in equities in 2020-21 and Rs 6,152 crore in 2019-20.

In the financial year 2022-23, most of the major central banks started hiking the interest rate, which resulted in the de-

an unprecedented rise in prices (inflation) in most economies. Apart from global mone-

tary tightening, volatile crude and rising commodity prices, along with Russia and Ukraine conflict, led to an exodus of foreign money in 2022-23.





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

During the investigations in the Umesh Pal murder case, police had detained Rakesh for questioning, the statement said. interrogation,

the Prayagraj police said in

a bag given by Parveen. Subsequently, the bag was recovered and two fake Aadhaar cards having the photo of Ali were found, police said, adding one of the Aadhaar cards carried the name of Sabir, son of Munne Siddiqui.

According to police, the case has been registered under sections 419 (punishment for cheating by personation), 420 (cheating and dishonestly inducing delivery of property), 467 (forgery of valuable security, will, etc.), 468 (forgery for purpose of cheating) and 471 (using as genuine a forged document or electronic record) of the Indian Penal Code. Umesh Pal and his two police security guards were shot dead on

Dhoomanganj. Based on a complaint lodged by Umesh Pal's wife Jaya Pal, a case was registered on February 25 against Atiq Ahmad, his brother Ashraf, wife Shaista Parveen, two sons, aides Guddu Muslim and Ghulam, and nine others.

On March 28, an MP/MLA court held Atiq Ahmad and two others guilty in the 2006 Umesh Pal kidnapping case and sentenced them to life imprisonment. That was Ahmad's first conviction even though more than 100 cases have been registered against him. The 60-yearold former Samaiwadi Party MP was brought from Sabarmati Jail in Gujarat by road for hearing

Four months after French author Lapierre's death, his guide 'leaves' Pilkhana slum forever

Howrah, Apr 09 (PTI)

Barely four months after the demise of author Dominique Lapierre, his Indian friend Reginald John who helped him understand the life of slum dwellers that was featured in his book City of Joy' also died, ending the era of love and compassion showered by the two among people of Pilkhana in West Bengal's Howrah district.

John, who earned nicknames like 'John Sir' and 'Bade Bhai' (elder brother) for his social services to the dwellers of Pilkhana, once considered the second largest slum in the country after Mumbai's Dharavi, breathed his last at a time when the industrial city of Howrah wit-

nessed communal violence during Ram Navami processions.

Lapierre, who passed away in December last year, and John are described by their admirers as men who could easily mingle with people and had big hearts. John who used to run an NGO was suffering from cancer. He died at the age of 70 on March 29.

"Instead of love, peace and kindness that Bade Bhai, Lapierre, and French priest Francoise Laborde showered here, now our city experienced clashes between two groups and hatred," said Mohammad Ejaj, a resident of Pilkhana, located around 3-4 kilometres from Howrah Railway Station.

'Over 2,000 rules, laws scrapped by Centre for ease of governance'

Mumbai, Apr 09 (PTI):

Union Minister Jitendra Singh has said more than 2,000 rules and laws were scrapped by the Narendra Modi government in the past nine years for ease of governance and ease of doing business, according to an official statement issued on Sunday.

Prime Minister spoke from the ramparts of Red Fort about the abolition of interview in job recruitment so that a level playing field could be provided. In pension, face recognition technology was introduced so that the elder citizens did not have to go through the tedious process of getting a life certificate," Singh

said. Most of the functioning was converted online and in order to bring in transparency, accountability and citizen participation, the human interface was reduced to the bare minimum, he said. Talking about public

grievance redressal, Singh said that the grievance redressal mechanism was shifted to Centralised Public Grievance Redress and Monitoring System (CPGRAMS) -- an online platform-- as a result of which about 20 lakh grievances are received every year in comparison to just 2 lakhs every year before this government came in because this government followed a policy of time bound redressal and gained the confidence of the people.

Sikkimese feel betrayed as Article 371F 'violated': Chamling

Gangtok, Apr 09 (PTI): Kumar Chamling claimed that the Sikkimese people feel betrayed as Article 371F, which guarantees special provisions for Sikkim, was 'violated". The former chief minister, in a telephonic interview with PTI. also alleged Sikkim had become a hotbed for political violence and sought President's rule to ensure a free and fair

election in 2024. According to Article 371F, only the descendants of Sikkim subjects (those who lived in the state before its merger with India) whose names were mentioned in the 1961 register are Sikkimese with rights to own land and get state government jobs. They were also exempted from paying income tax.

"But now, the Financial 2023 redefines Sikkimese as any Indian citizen domiciled in Sikkim, extending to them the same benefits as that of the original inhabitants whose forefathers' names were in the 1961 register,' Chamling said.

'Saffron flag will be unfurled all over Maha in 202

Ayodhya (UP), Apr 09 (PTI):

Maharashtra Minister and Shiv Sena leader Eknath Shinde on Sunday said the ideology of his party and that of the BJP is the same and they will unfurl the saffron flag all over the state next year.

"Our party's role is clear. The Shiv Sena has an alliance with the BJP. Our ideology, which is Hindutva, is the same. We will go to our state with new energy from Ayodhya and serve the people. In 2024, the Shiv Sena and the BJP's 'bhagva' (saffron flag) will be unfurled in the entire state," he said

while addressing a press conference here. The Lok Sabha election as well as the Maharashtra Assembly polls are due next year. Shinde is on his maiden visit to Ayodhya after becoming the chief minister in June last year. He has been accompanied to the temple town in Uttar Pradesh by thousands of Shiv Sainiks.

Without naming anyone, the Maharashtra chief minister said there are a few people who are "allergic" to Hindutva, because if it (Hindutva) reaches every household in the country, their "shop" will be closed.

"In the evening, there will be 'aarti' on the banks of the Sarayu river and there is a programme of taking the blessings of seers. Many people are a little allergic to this. I will say only one thing -- the Ram mandir and Ayodhya are not political issues for the Shiv Sena and the BJP. It is a matter of our faith and belief," he said.

Shinde said now that the construction work of the Ram temple has started, Ayodhya will witness rapid progress and lakhs of people will benefit from it. "Our Ayodhya visit is causing pleasure to lakhs of people.
