

BMC eviction drive continues for the second day along the service lane

Bhilai, Nov 30: On the second day of the eviction campaign being run on the service road by Bhilai Municipal Corporation, 5 junk vehicles, 6 handcarts and 3 glow sign boards, banner posters were removed and the road was cleared for vehicular traffic. Action was taken at 20 places and a penalty Rs 34,500 was collected.

On the instructions of Commissioner Rohit Vyas, on the second day of the eviction campaign being run by the Corporation on the service road adjacent to GE Road, the road was made free from obstructions by removing the handcarts and junk vehicle which were obstructing the traffic on the service road in the north direction.



Signboards, banners and posts of the shops installed on the road were confiscated. The car showroom operating in Sanjay Nagar had encircled the entire service road and put up a gate which was broken up with the use of JCB to make it equal to

the service road.

The glow sign boards of Travel Agency, Pathology Lab and Medical Stores near Kamala Medical, which were buried in the ground, were also removed with a JCB. On the second day of the campaign, action was taken at



20 places and a fine amount of Rs 34,500 was collected.

There has been a good response to the campaign being run by the corporation among the common citizens. The operation to vacate the service road will continue in the next

coming days.

Additional Commissioner Ashok Dwivedi said that the businessmen on both sides of the GE Road who have obstructed the road by illegal encroachment or encroachment on the side of the service road

should remove their encroachment on their own, otherwise the corporation will initiate eviction proceedings along with fine and confiscation of material. 7775 postal ballot papers received till Nov 30

Bhilai, Nov 30: A total of 7775 postal ballot papers have been received till 30 November 2023 under the Assembly Elections-2023.

According to the information received from Additional Collector Gokul Raote (Authorized Nodal Officer, Postal Ballot), 1093 postal ballots have been received from Assembly Constituency No 62 Patan; 1411 postal ballots in 63 Durg Rural, 2260 postal ballots in Assembly Constituency No 64 Durg city; 950 postal ballots in Assembly

Constituency No 65 Bhilai Nagar, 1129 postal ballots in Assembly Constituency No 66 Vaishali Nagar and 932 postal ballot papers have been received in Assembly Constituency No 67 Ahiwara.

These include 6846 postal ballot papers received by the special carrier from the convenience center for the voters deployed on election duty, 469 postal ballot papers received by post and 460 postal ballot papers received by the specially constituted polling team for Divyang, 80 Plus and Covid Positive.

Bhilai, Nov 30: Collector Pushpendra Kumar Meena chaired a review meeting of the Health Department in the Collectorate. He gave instructions to the health department officials to further improve the health services. Under maternal mortality, there have been 19 deaths in the district in 2022-23 and 14 deaths in 2023-24 (from April to October). These patients were suffering from different diseases.

Health officers of all the development blocks along with Chief Medical Officer Dr JP Meshram were present in the meeting. The Collector took information about the National TB Eradication Programme. Under this, a target was set to test 33330 patients on the basis of symptoms of TB ie on suspicion of having TB. Against this

target, 21474 patients were examined. A target was set to test a total of 4500 patients in Dhamdha, Patan and Durg development blocks, out of which a total of 3607 patients were tested from January to October. Out of the total 304 gram panchayats in the district in Durg, Patan and Dhamdha development blocks, 100 gram panchayats have been made TB free. During the review meeting, the Collector took information about leprosy in the district. The health official said that leprosy affects

certain areas of the skin and can be severe. 546 leprosy patients are being treated in the district. Similarly, 778 probable dengue patients were found in the district, out of which positive cases were found in 285 patients. The Collector inquired about the filling of vacant posts in health centers under the National Mission. The Collector asked to complete the recruitment process soon after the code of conduct is over. Along with this, he reviewed the construction work of the building.

● Civic Bodies to register pull carts of roadside vendors

Bhilai, Nov 30: Collector Pushpendra Kumar Meena reviewed the works related to the urban bodies the other day. During the review, he took information about all the urban bodies and gave necessary instructions.

Keeping in view the market and transportation facilities, the Collector asked to organize the roadside vendors and pull carts. He said that often traffic jams occur due to the roadside vendors and their pull carts.

Considering the situation, the Collector gave instructions to the Municipal Corporation Commissioners to organize the roadside carts. The Collector instructed the Civic Body officers to mark spots and shift 15500 pull carts in these spots. He said that if it is not possible to keep the carts in the vending zone, then appropriate spots on the roadside can be selected. He also instructed the Municipal Corporation Commissioners to register all the pull carts under their respective municipal limits.

The Collector questioned about the scrap vehicles lying on the road

side. He said that many scrap cars are kept on the roadside and near workshops, which disrupt smooth traffic flow. He asked the Municipal Corporation Commissioners to identify a suitable place for such vehicles.

The Collector instructed the Municipal Corporation Commissioners to make arrangements for fogging to prevent diseases caused by mosquitoes.

The Commissioners replied that 108 places have been selected in Durg, 58 in Bhilai, 54 in Charoda, 12 in Kumhari, 16 in Jamul, 23 in Dhamdha, 15 in Amleshwar, 12 in Ahiwara

and 7 in Utai. He asked to make proper arrangements to drive away mosquitoes in waterlogged places.

The Collector asked the Municipal Corporation Commissioners to identify the homeless beggars.

The Municipal Corporation Commissioner said that till now 123 homeless beggars have been identified.

The Collector said that those begging on the streets should be accommodated in relief centres. Besides, instructions were given to keep the children involved in begging at the child shelter. Along with this, the Collector has ordered to shift the stray cattle to nearby Gauthans.

According to the order of the District Magistrate, any person within the district cannot possess or carry lethal weapons like gun, pistol, rifle, revolver, sword, axe, spear, stick, knife, razor, axe, lance, Gupti, Trishul, Khorkhari, other types of

ness, old age and lameness, are required to have a stick as support.

The said illegal act will be prohibited up to a radius of 300 meters around the counting center Shri Shankaracharya Engineering College, Junwani Bhilai till the end of counting on the counting day. On the counting day, carrying and using mobile phones will be prohibited within a radius of 300 meters of the counting centre.

Action will be taken against the group and person violating this order under Section 188 of the Indian Penal Code. This order will remain effective from 6 am on December 3, 2023 till the end of counting of votes.

HYU: About 1000 applications received for PhD entrance examination

Bhilai, Nov 30: About one thousand online applications received till the last date for the PhD entrance examination in 19 subjects, which is to be held on December 17 in Hemchand Yadav University, Durg.

Giving this information, the Dean of Student Welfare of the University, Dr Prashant Srivastava said that Hindi, English, Commerce, Education, Biotechnology, Microbiology, Botany, Zoology, Physics, Mathematics, History, Political Science, Sociology, Geography, Economics, Home Science, Geology and Psychology sub-

jects are included.

Dr Srivastava said that out of the applications received, more than two hundred applications are from applicants who have passed the national level UGC, CSIR, NET/SET examination. It is not mandatory for such candidates to appear in the PhD entrance examination.

Such applicants will fall in the exempted category from the entrance examination. Their admission will be done in the research centers for PhD where interviews will be conducted by the University after issuing the notification regarding PhD by the University.

It will be mandatory

for all other applicants to appear in the entrance examination to be held on December 17, 2023 from 11:00 hrs to 13:00 hrs on the basis of merit. Merit selection list will be prepared in each subject by combining both written and interview examinations.

Dr Srivastava said that as per UGC rules, there will be a question paper based on objective questions of total 100 marks in each subject, in which the candidate will have to solve 50 questions of 02 marks each.

Out of these 50 questions, 25 questions will be from the student's related subject and 25 questions will be based on research methodology. The marks obtained by the student will be

Exit polls: Close contest being seen in Ch'garh

Raipur: Polling is over for assembly elections in five states and results are awaited on 3rd December. But before counting of votes the process of exit poll has started. Tough competition is being seen in Chhattisgarh. According to exit polls, the ruling Congress has crossed majority figure in the state whereas BJP has also come very close to majority while chasing Congress. This means that compared to 2018, this time a close contest is being seen in the state. According to exit polls, number of seats for Congress seems to be decreasing whereas BJP is looking towards the lead. According to Today's Chanakya survey, Congress is expected to get 57 (+8) seats in Chhattisgarh whereas BJP is expected to get 33 (+8) seats. Other parties are expected to get 0-3 seats. According to C Voter, Congress is getting 41 to 53 seats in Chhattisgarh. According to India Today, Congress is capturing 40-50 seats. According to the matrix, Congress is expected to get 44-52 seats. Talking about BJP, according to C-Voter, the party is getting 36-48 seats, according to India Today, 36-46 seats and according to Matriage, BJP is getting 34-42 seats.

BJP will win, claims Raman Singh

Raipur: While exit polls are predicting a close fight between the ruling Congress and the opposition Bharatiya Janata Party in Chhattisgarh, both Chief Minister Bhupesh Baghel and former CM Raman Singh on Thursday predicted thumping wins for their parties. Assembly polls were held in two phases in the state on November 7 and 17, while results will be declared on December 3. Meanwhile, senior BJP leader and former CM Raman Singh said his party will get 52-55 seats and form government with a clear majority. "Exit polls are showing that BJP is reaching 48 seats from 15 (seats won by party in 2018), which is a result of the party's efforts in electioneering. But I believe BJP will get 52 to 55 seats. It will be clear after counting of votes on December 3," Singh said. The BJP has been heading in a good direction due to its manifesto and the support of women and the youth, he claimed.

SC extends hearing into Soumya Chourasia bail petition till Dec 5

The Supreme Court has extended the hearing on the bail petition by Soumya Chourasia till Dec 5. On behalf of the ED, facts against the bail petition were to be given in the Supreme Court, but the ED's advocate could not be present and it was on the health ground that he remained absent. In this bail petition the hearing was done by Justice Bela M Trivedi and Justice Aniruddh Bose bench in the Supreme Court.

Now the Supreme Court

has extended the hearing into the bail petition of Soumya Chourasia till Dec 5. It is notable here that Soumya Chourasia was taken into arrest last year on Dec 2, 2022 and since then she is in Central Jail. The High Court has made strong comments against bail petition of Soumya Chourasia and she is considered to be one of the most powerful and effective female officer during CM Bhupesh Baghel's term in the office.

BJP will not touch double digits in Ch'garh: Shukla

Raipur, Nov 30: With exit poll results on assembly elections coming out on Thursday evening, Pradesh Congress Committee communication head Sushil Anand Shukla said that the election results of Chhattisgarh will be in favor of Congress. This time Congress will form the government in the state with three-fourth majority, he said, adding that more than 75 Congress MLAs will win the elections whereas BJP will not even be able to reach double digits in the elections. Shukla further said that public voted in favor of Congress after seeing the 5 years of work of the Congress government and the face of Chief Minister Bhupesh Baghel. The Congress government has won the trust of the people of the state in five years, he said and added that after forming the government with 68 seats in 2018, Congress won 5 by-elections, urban body and panchayat elections. Congress never lost any election in 5 years, he said, adding that this time also Congress will keep the record intact. Shukla also said that BJP con-

tested elections in Chhattisgarh under the leadership of ED. Keeping in mind the constitutional norms, the ED adopted various tactics during the elections to hinder the political activities of the Congress, he alleged. In order to tarnish the image of the Chief Minister, false allegations were made by issuing a press note based on the fake statement of a person, he said. On the basis of that, BJP leaders including Prime Minister put the false story of ED in front of the public, but the public rejected the conspiracies of the BJP, he added.

He further said that, during the entire election, the entire BJP was looking dwarf in front of the stature of Bhupesh Baghel. The Prime Minister himself was forced to attend 7 meetings and more than a dozen Union Ministers including Amit Shah and half a dozen Chief Ministers had camped in Chhattisgarh at the behest of Adani, said Shukla, adding that all the BJP leaders were engaged in false propaganda against Bhupesh Baghel.

Troubled by debt, youth commits suicide

Jashpur, Nov 30:

Troubled by debt, a 30-year-old youth committed suicide by consuming poison in Jashpur district of Chhattisgarh. The police have sent the body to the PM besides initiating investigation into the matter. This incident took place in Ghughri village of Bagicha police station area.

In fact, the deceased Amir Ram's father Phoolchand was in his house. Suddenly he started vomiting and foam started coming out of his mouth. The deceased's father Phoolchand was the first to see it and called the ambulance and asked for help. As soon as the ambulance arrived, the young man was brought to Bagicha Hospital in critical condition, where the young man died after about an hour of treatment.

Deceased's father Phoolchand told that his son had obtained a loan of about Rs 1 lakh sixty thousand from a private bank, due to which he was very worried. He was burdened with a loan of Rs 30,000, Rs 50,000 and Rs 80,000 from different groups, for the recovery of which the group members were harassing him daily. Last two days also, pressure was put on him by the group to recover the loan. Since then he was being mentally tortured. The father of deceased Amir Ram told that Amir was married and had two children. They earned their living by working with bamboo. Many times he has also helped Amir to repay his loan. This time he was not able to help him because the loan amount was high. He does not even own any big land property.

Admission in five new SAGEMS schools in city ends

Raipur, Nov 30:

The wait for admission in five new Swami Atmanand Govt English Medium Schools (SAGEMS) is over. Orders have been issued to give admission to students till Nov 30. The admission process in schools will start from Wednesday. Admission is to be done in all classes from 1st to 12th in the five new Atmanand schools opened in the city. In classes where additional applications for seats have been received, students will be given admission through lottery. Many schools have not received even a single application for classes 9th to 12th.

According to experts, due to the opening of new schools in the middle of the academic session, the parents of the students of these classes have not shown interest.



Applications were invited by the Education Department from October 4 to 14 for admission in five new schools.

In the midst of the academic session, 26 new Swami Atmanand English medium schools are being opened in the state including Raipur. Applications for admission to all these schools were invited in October. The admission process was halted due to

seats in the first class. 300 forms have been received for 50 seats in Kashiram Sharma Government School, more than 50 candidates applied for the first 30 seats in Trimurti Nagar school, about 150 applications have been received for 50 seats in Raipura School. The new schools have approximately 720 seats in different classes.

Applications have not been received in most of the schools for admission from class 9th to class 10th. Since it is 10th-12th board, parents do not want to disturb their children in between the academic session. For this reason also applications were not received. Board exams are proposed in March. Almost 80 percent of the courses in schools have also been completed. Changing school will also affect studies.

India on US alleging official's role in murder plot

New Delhi, Nov 30 (PTI):

India on Thursday described as a "matter of concern" the US charging an Indian national with conspiring to kill a Sikh separatist on American soil, and asserted that a high-level probe committee will investigate all aspects of the case. India has constituted a probe team to investigate allegations relating to the foiled plot to kill Gurpatwant Singh Pannun, a Sikh extremist and known to be an American and Canadian citizen.

On Wednesday, US federal prosecutors charged Indian national Nikhil Bagchi said.

"We have said and let me reiterate that this is also contrary to government policy," he said at a media briefing. Bagchi said the "nexus between organised crime, trafficking, gunrunning and extremists at an international level is a serious issue for the law enforcement agencies and organisations to consider and it is precisely for that reason a high-level inquiry committee has been constituted and we will obviously be guided by its results."

The MEA spokesperson said the US side shared some "inputs" pertaining to nexus between organised criminals, gun runners and terrorists and that India takes such inputs seriously since they impinge on "our national security interests as well" and that relevant

departments were examining the issue. "During the course of discussions with the US on bilateral security cooperation, the US side shared some inputs pertaining to nexus between organised criminals, gun runners, terrorists and other extremists," he said.

"We take such inputs very seriously and a high level inquiry committee has been constituted to look into all the relevant aspects of the matter," he said, in identical remarks that he made on Wednesday. Bagchi said India will take necessary follow-up action based on the findings of the enquiry committee.

■ Strict enforcement of COTPA Act in focus

In a significant move to promote a healthier environment, the District Level Coordination Committee convened under the National Tobacco Control Programme at the Collectorate's Arpa Hall. The meeting emphasized the effective enforcement of the COTPA Act (Cigarette and Other Tobacco Products Act) of 2003. Collector Priyanka Rishi Mahobia has set a phased plan to declare all educational institutions in the district as tobacco-free and has initiated awareness campaigns through banners, posters, pamphlets, and more to educate the public about the hazards of tobacco consumption and ways to prevent it.

The district aims to gradually transform all its



educational institutions into tobacco-free zones. To achieve this goal, Collector Mahobia plans to counsel schoolchildren on the dangers of tobacco use, train teachers in tobacco control measures, and organize various awareness activities such as essay, debate, and speech competitions in schools. Additionally, anti-addiction competitions will be conducted as part of this public awareness campaign. The Collector also urged action against

shops displaying tobacco product advertisements, involving Sub Divisional Revenue Officer, District Education Officer, Tehsildar, and Chief Municipality Officer. The meeting highlighted the need for effective implementation of the COTPA Act to create a smoke-free district. Technical assistance from "Blibarg-Ek Pahale Da Yuniyan Sanstha" at the state and district levels is being sought to achieve this. Sanjay Namdev,

Divisional Coordinator of the organization, elucidated various provisions of the COTPA Act, emphasizing the complete ban on smoking and tobacco consumption in public places and government offices in the district, with violators facing a Rs 200 fine. The sale of tobacco products within 100 yards of educational institutions is also prohibited, with a similar financial penalty for violations. Strict punitive actions will be taken against those promoting and ad-

vertising tobacco products within the district. Mandatory display of information boards under the COTPA Act 2003 was emphasized for public places, sales centers, and educational institutions.

The meeting also discussed the need for coordination among various departments, including labor, child protection, food, railway, municipality, gram panchayat, and police, to effectively control tobacco use in the district. Present at the meeting were Additional Collector Namrata Anand Dongre, District Nodal Officer of the National Tobacco Control Program Dr. Paras Jain, DPM Vibha Toppo, Sub-Divisional Officer (Revenue) Marwahi and Pendra Road, all district CEOs, Tehsildars, District Education Officer, Chief Municipality Officer, Block Education Officer, and other stakeholders committed to creating a tobacco-free district.

The process of counting votes using machines (EVMs) will begin half an hour after the counting begins. Strong rooms will be opened on December 3 at 7 am. During this time, videography of the entire process will also be done.

Yadav Samaj celebrate Govardhan Puja


Kondagaon, Nov 30:

Fighting Digital Fraud


The recent gathering convened by the Centre to deliberate on financial cybersecurity and the escalating digital payment fraud dilemma provided a stark reminder of the gravity of the situation. In this arena, where the digital landscape is increasingly becoming a battleground, some disconcerting statistics came to light. It was disclosed that a staggering 70 lakh mobile phone connections have been implicated in cybercrime and financial fraud, leading to their disconnection. Additionally, a sum of Rs 900 crore, pilfered from 3.5 lakh victims, has been successfully recovered. As we navigate these treacherous waters, two fundamental strategies emerge: enhancing user awareness about cyber fraud and fostering improved multi-agency coordination. In the realm of cybersecurity, threats continually evolve, relentlessly probing for vulnerabilities within our digital infrastructure. Stringent know-your-customer (KYC) norms for financial services have been suggested as a way forward. It is worth noting that a remarkable 87 percent of Indians have embraced financial technology, surpassing the global average of 64 percent. Yet, the path to constructing a robust cybersecurity infrastructure is not without its challenges. It demands substantial investments and unwavering commitment. In this endeavor, the Centre must continue to serve as a facilitator, driving both the public and private sectors to fortify their defenses, enhance their detection capabilities, and refine their response mechanisms. One cannot overstate the importance of user awareness in this age of digital transactions. As technology permeates every facet of our lives, the onus is on each individual to safeguard their financial well-being. Being vigilant and cautious when engaging in digital payments, recognizing common cyber fraud tactics, and promptly reporting any suspicious activity are all crucial components of this defense. 
Unsung Heroes of Tunnel Rescue

In the annals of human resilience and ingenuity, stories often emerge that reaffirm the indomitable spirit that resides within us. The recent rescue operation at the Silkyara Bend-Barkot tunnel in Uttarakhand is one such tale, where outlawed coal miners, practitioners of the now-banned rat-hole mining technique, emerged as unsung heroes. Their extraordinary efforts, alongside the relentless determination of the trapped workers and the failings of imported machinery, spotlight the irreplaceable essence of human endeavour. The National Green Tribunal (NGT) deemed rat-hole mining "unscientific" and perilous for labourers, leading to its ban in 2014. Despite the prohibition, reports of this illegal coal mining practice continue to surface, especially in regions like Meghalaya, where it thrives behind closed doors. Yet, what transpired in the depths of Uttarakhand's treacherous terrain showcases the remarkable capabilities of those who toil in these underground passages. US-imported machines, designed to bore through the most formidable of obstacles, were employed for over a fortnight in a painstaking attempt to create a path through the debris-choked tunnel. Progress was slow, fraught with excruciating challenges, and hope wavered. However, it was the hands of rat-hole miners, armed with rudimentary equipment and sheer determination, that eventually broke through the last barrier of rubble. In this triumph of human effort over mechanization, we are reminded of Elbert Hubbard's astute observation: "One machine can do the work of fifty ordinary men. No machine can do the work of one extraordinary man." The relentless pursuit of excellence, unwavering persistence, and tireless effort showcased by these miners are testaments to the extraordinary potential that resides within each of us. The successful rescue of 41 trapped workers, emerging through an escape passage created with steel Hume pipes, measuring 57 meters long, was met with jubilation across the nation. India's 1.45 billion citizens celebrated this remarkable feat as the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) played a pivotal role in bringing the workers to safety. Prime Minister Narendra Modi, recognizing the valour and resilience displayed, announced a reward of Rs 1 lakh for each rescue worker. As we extend our heartfelt wishes for the speedy recovery of these survivors, we must acknowledge that only they truly comprehend the magnitude of the trauma they endured beneath layers of debris. Their courage serves as a beacon of hope and resilience in the face of adversity. This rescue operation also serves as a stark reminder to our authorities and policymakers. It underscores the critical importance of meticulous scrutiny and comprehensive feasibility studies before embarking on infrastructure projects in fragile environments like the Himalayas. Unfortunately, we seem to have not learned from past tragedies in places like Joshimath and Shimla. When we fail to respect the natural world and heed its warnings, it invariably retaliates. The heroics of the rat-hole miners in Uttarakhand highlight the human spirit's capacity to overcome adversity and the imperative need for prudent, nature-sensitive planning in all our endeavors. Their story must inspire us to honor the fragile balance between human development and nature's sanctity, reminding us that when we neglect the earth's wisdom, it ultimately strikes back.

India was once regarded as having one of the best football teams in Asia, with a golden era in the 1950s and early 1960s. India won the gold medal in football at the Asian Games twice, in 1951 in Delhi and again in 1962 in Jakarta. India's last major success in Asian games football came in 1970 when they won a bronze medal in Bangkok. After the 1970s, Indian football gradually lost its former glory. Since 1990, India's football success has been primarily limited to SAFF games, with victories over minnows such as Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Maldives, Nepal, and Bangladesh. After a 25-year absence, India qualified to compete in football at the 2022 Hangzhou Asian Games. However, they were defeated (0-2) by Saudi Arabia in the pre-quarterfinals.

The All India Football Federation (AIFF) governs Indian football, which is overseen by FIFA. Indian football has had some success in international football over the last two decades, and they are improving day by day. Football tournaments such as the ISL and I-League provided Indian footballers with valuable exposure as well as financial stability. However, the Indian football team remains far behind Asian standards. The recent world cup qualifying match between India and Qatar at Kalinga Stadium in Bhubaneswar (21-11-2023), which India lost (0-3), clearly exposed the Indian football team's weaknesses.

The 2026 Fifa World Cup will be the largest ever, staged in Canada, Mexico, and the United States, with a brand new format involving 16 more nations. For the first time, 48 teams will compete in the next World Cup. As a result, Asia has been assigned eight direct slots and another possible slot that will be determined by an inter-confederation playoff. The number of Asian teams in the World Cup has grown from four to eight. Fifa did this to ensure the participation of the world's two most populous countries, China and

India. China previously competed in the Korea-Japan World Cup in 2002 but had disastrous results, losing all three matches against Brazil (0-4), Turkey (0-3), and Costa Rica (0-2).

The first round of India's World Cup qualifying matches is currently underway. India defeated Kuwait (1-0) but lost to Qatar. India still has four matches remaining, two against Afghanistan and one each against Qatar and Kuwait. India can advance to the second round if they win three of their four matches. The second stage will feature 18 teams divided into three groups. The top two teams from each of the three groups will qualify for the 2026 World Cup. The top five spots are very likely to be shared by Asian football's giants, South Korea, Japan, Iran, Saudi Arabia, and Qatar.

For the remaining three slots, at least 12 strong teams are competing, including Uzbekistan, Syria, the United Arab Emirates, Iraq, Indonesia, Vietnam, Bahrain, Malaysia, Oman, Kyrgyzstan, China, and Thailand. Among these countries, all teams expect Indonesia, Malaysia, and Thailand to rank higher than India. In short, India's entry into the 2026 World Cup will be difficult.

Football is without a doubt the most popular sport in the world. With the participation of both China and India, the Fifa World Cup will become more global. The participation of China and India in the World Cup means increased viewership and revenue for football and Fifa. Although India did not qualify for the 2022 World Cup in Qatar, one of the world cup's sponsors was an Indian company, BYJU'S. The year 2030 will be the centenary of Fifa World Cup, and it will be held in six countries (Spain, Portugal, Morocco, Argentina, Paraguay, and Uruguay). Let us hope that India will participate in the 2030 World Cup. For the world's largest democratic nation, it will be a dream come true.



India's GDP grows 7.6 pc in Sep quarter

■ Remains fastest-growing major economy

New Delhi, Nov 30:

India's economy grew 7.6 per cent in the September quarter of this fiscal and remained the fastest-growing large economy, mainly due to better performance by manufacturing, mining and services sectors, the government data showed on Thursday. The gross domestic product (GDP) expanded by 6.2 per cent in the July-September quarter of 2022-23. India remained the fastest-growing major economy, as China posted a 4.9 per cent growth in July-September 2023.

According to the National Statistical Office (NSO) data, the agriculture sector GVA (Gross Value Added) growth decelerated

to 1.2 per cent in the September 2023 quarter from 2.5 per cent a year ago. The expansion in financial, real estate and professional services' GVA was 6 per cent, down from 7.1 per cent in the year-ago quarter. The GVA in the manufacturing sector showed a growth of 13.9 per cent in the second quarter of the current fiscal compared to a contraction of 3.8 per cent in the year-ago period. As per the data, the output (GVA) in the 'mining and quarrying' accelerated to 10 per cent in the second quarter against a contraction of 0.1 per cent a year ago. Electricity, gas, water supply and other utility services' grew by 10.1 per cent from 6.1 per cent.

If further said the GDP at constant (2011-12) prices in April-September 2023-24 (H1 2023-24) is estimated at Rs 82.11 lakh crore against Rs 76.22 lakh crore during the corresponding period of previous year, showing

(GDP) during the April-June quarter of 2023-24 remained unchanged at 7.8 per cent. "Real GDP or GDP at Constant (2011-12) Prices in Q2 2023-24 is estimated to attain a level of Rs 41.74 lakh crore, as against Rs 38.78 lakh crore in Q2 2022-23, showing a growth of 7.6 per cent as compared to 6.2 per cent in Q2 2022-23," the NSO said in a statement. Nominal GDP or GDP at current prices in Q2 2023-24 is estimated at Rs 71.66 lakh crore against Rs 65.67 lakh crore in Q2 2022-23, showing a growth of 9.1 per cent as compared to 17.2 per cent in Q2 2022-23, it added.

The construction sector recorded a growth of 13.3 per cent year-on-year in the second quarter compared to 5.7 per cent. The growth in gross domestic product

GDP at current prices in H1 2023-24 is estimated at Rs 142.33 lakh crore compared to Rs 131.09 lakh crore during the corresponding period of the previous year, showing a growth of 8.6 per cent in H1 2023-24 against 22.2 per cent in H1 2022-23. Meanwhile, the output of eight key infrastructure sectors jumped 12.1 per cent in October 2023 against 0.7 per cent expansion in the year-ago period on account of a sharp uptick in production of coal, steel, cement and electricity, according to the official data. The government's fiscal deficit at the end of October touched 45 per cent of the full-year budget estimate, according to data released by the Controller General of Accounts (CGA) on Thursday.


"There is considerable volatility in the international oil market and prices fluctuate wildly," an official said. "Oil companies can cut prices by Re 1 per litre and everyone will applaud. But when international oil prices go up, will they be allowed to raise rates remains in doubt." India is the world's third largest oil consuming and importing nation. It imports more than 85 per cent of its oil needs and hence domestic pricing is linked to international rates. The basket of crude oil that India buys has averaged USD 83.42 per barrel in November, down from USD 90.08 of October and USD 93.54 of September. While at current prices, oil companies are making some money on petrol, diesel - the most

consumed fuel accounting for almost 40 per cent of all petroleum products consumed in the country - but it has been in a "touch-and-go" scenario in recent weeks, another official said. "On some days there is profit on diesel but on other days there is loss. There is no consistent trend."

Three retailers had been recouping losses they incurred for holding rates when crude oil prices shot through the roof last year. In May, international oil prices and retail pump rates had come at par, but the subsequent surge widened the gulf between cost and price realised.

"For oil companies to revert to daily market based price revision, oil prices will have to come below USD 80 on a sustained basis," an official said.

Key infra sectors growth up at 12.1 pc in October



New Delhi, Nov 30:

The output of eight key infrastructure sectors rose by 12.1 per cent in October 2023 against 0.7 per cent expansion in the year-ago period, according to the official data released on Thursday. All the sectors except for fertiliser recorded healthy production growth in the month under review. The

core sector (coal, crude oil, natural gas, refinery products, fertiliser, steel, cement and electricity) growth in September was 9.2 per cent. Coal, steel, cement and electricity production recorded double-digit growth. The output growth of eight sectors was at 8.6 per cent in April-October 2023-24 against 8.4 per cent in the year-ago period.

Stock markets edge up in volatile trade on derivatives expiry, rise for 3rd day

Mumbai, Nov 30:

Benchmark equity indices Sensex and Nifty eked out gains on Thursday to extend the winning run for a third straight day in a highly volatile trade amid the scheduled monthly derivatives expiry and muted trend in the US markets.

The 30-share BSE Sensex closed 86.53 points or 0.13 per cent higher at 66,988.44, registering its third day of gains. Stock markets witnessed heavy volatility due to the monthly expiry of derivatives contracts and oscillated between gains and losses during the day. Sensex hit a high of 67,069.89 and a low of 66,610.35 in day trade.

Despite heavy volatility, the combined market valuation of all listed companies on the leading stock exchange BSE continued to remain above the USD 4-trillion mark for the second day in a row. 'Cong will win Raj polls, BJP to lose in all 5 states'

Jaipur, Nov 30 (PTI):

Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot on Thursday said he was confident of a Congress win in Rajasthan assembly polls, and added that the BJP would not form the government in any of the five states where elections are being held. Five state went to polls in November. While polling in Telangana will end Thursday evening, it was held earlier in the month in Mizoram, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan. Results of the elections will be declared on December 3. "Congress government will be formed (in Rajasthan). In all five states, I feel that BJP is not going to form

only government in the country, which has no anti-incumbency factor against it. "People are saying that the chief minister has not left any stone unturned in doing development works," Gehlot slammed the "frightening language" used by BJP leaders, including Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Union Home Minister Amit Shah, during the election campaign. "It was the language of vengeance and creating tension," he said. "No one liked the language they spoke. They were attacking me because they could not topple my government like they did in Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka and Madhya Pradesh. They failed."

ASSEMBLY POLLS IN 5 STATES

EC cracked the whip; seizures over Rs 1760 cr made

New Delhi, Nov 30 (PTI):

The Election Commission cracked its whip on several occasions to ensure a level playing field for all parties in the five states where assembly polls are being held even as authorities seized freebies, drugs, cash and liquor worth over Rs 176 crore aimed at alluring voters.

Acting on complaints and inputs by the local poll machinery, the EC issued show cause notices and advisories to top politicians to adhere to the provisions of the model code.

It withdrew permission given to the Telangana

government for disbursements of financial aid to farmers for rabi crops under the Rythu Bandhu Scheme after a state minister violated the provisions of the model code by making a public announcement about it.

The poll panel had given its nod to the state government to disburse the rabi installment during the model code of conduct period on certain grounds.

It had also asked the government not to carry out the proposed Viksit Bharat Sankalp Yatra, its mega outreach programme on schemes and initiatives, in these five states till December 5.

The government had made it clear that the yatra will not cover polling states till the model code of conduct was in force. Based on complaints from rival parties, the EC issued notices to former Congress president Rahul Gandhi, his sister and party general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma and BRS chief and Telangana Chief Minister K Chandrashekhar Rao.

He was later issued an advisory and asked to follow the model code in letter and spirit. Recently, the Election Commission also sought an explanation from the Congress government in Karnataka over advertisements publicising its achievements in newspapers in poll-bound Telangana.

In a letter to the Karnataka chief secretary, the commission said the state government did not obtain prior approval from it for publishing the advertisements, an action violative of the poll code.

It also said the publication of any such advertisement by the government of Karnataka in Telangana should stop with immediate effect till necessary approvals are taken by the state government from the commission.
